Communication Guidelines for Parents & Guardians

As partners in education our school staff, the senior team and the board of trustees are always interested in receiving information and feedback from the community. It keeps us in touch with the community and helps us anticipate and deal effectively with any questions or concerns you may have.

However, there may be times when you contact your trustee with questions or concerns and your trustee will refer you to our policy called "Communication Guidelines for Parents & Staff". These important guidelines are posted on our website: www.wcdsb.ca/AP Memos/PDF/APC001.PDF.

The guidelines are in place to help you resolve your questions or concerns quickly right there at your school. While under provincial legislation your trustee does not have the legal power to solve your issue personally they will certainly be a valuable resource in helping you use the guidelines to reach the appropriate staff person for assistance.

The guidelines are very simple: If you have a concern involving your child you should first speak directly to the child's teacher. If the issue remains unresolved, you should speak to the school Principal. If the issue continues to be unresolved, you should speak to the Superintendent of Learning for that school. These guidelines have been a huge success and the vast majority of issues are resolved even before reaching the school superintendent or calling a trustee.

In cases where you do wish to speak directly to a trustee you may contact any of the nine adult trustees at any time. While they have been elected based out of various local municipalities they represent all Catholic ratepayers in Waterloo Region and will be happy to assist regardless of where you live in the Region.

?? WHAT IS THIS ??

You may have already noticed this strange shape on the front of this newsletter.

It's called a "Quick Response" or "QR" code. If you have a smartphone with Internet connectivity, chances are you can read QR codes with the simple push of a button.

All you need is to download a free QR reader "app" and away you go. In fact, your smartphone may have the app pre-installed.

How do QR codes work, you ask? It's very simple. The code you see here has a link to an Internet website embedded in it. All you do is use the app on your smartphone to snap a picture of the code and you will be instantly transported to the website.

Scanning this particular code on your phone will launch an eight minute video telling you everything you need to know about why Waterloo Region's Catholic schools are among the best in the world.

Future "Community Update" newsletters will feature QR code links to other important information.
